Bodmin Keep - Cornwall's Army Museum

Bodmin Keep, Castle Canyke Road, Bodmin, Cornwall, PL31 1EG

Discover some of Bodmin Keep's hidden stories including Emily Hobhouse and the Boer War while exploring our collection. Learn about the Ellis Collection at Kresen Kernow and Jewish experiences during the Second World War with our friendly team.

'THAT BLOODY WOMAN!' EMILY HOBHOUSE AND THE BOER WAR

Join our Trainee Curator Isabella to find out about the Cornish welfare campaigner, feminist, and pacifist, Emily Hobhouse who drew attention to the British concentration camps in South Africa during the Boer War of 1899 to 1902. Explore some of the fascinating objects from this period in our collection.

THROUGH THE LENS - BODMIN DURING THE SECOND WORLD WAR

George Ellis came to Cornwall at the outbreak of the Second World War and began work as a press photographer. His early images show life in Cornwall and the impact of the War. In total, there are over 100,000 images in this extraordinary collection spanning 35 years which is currently held at Kresen Kernow in Redruth. Join our Digital Intern, Charlotte to discover how Ellis Collection photos were utilised during the Second World War and Holocaust project and then shared with the community in a short talk.

THE JEWISH COMMUNITY IN CORNWALL DURING THE SECOND WORLD WAR

Find out about evacuee, Kindertransport and refugee experiences of the Jewish community in Cornwall during the War with Jo, our Learning and Participation Manager.

As part of your museum visit, you will explore displays of our collections dating from 1702-2007; telling the stories of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry and the Light Infantry, and their founding regiments. Collect a Top Ten trail for families on arrival to explore our collections.

CWGC Tours: War Graves of Falmouth Cemetery

Old Chapels, Pennance Road, Falmouth, Cornwall, TR11 4ED

Come along to find out more about the history and work of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission whilst exploring the graves we care for at Falmouth Cemetery.

Falmouth became a drifter base in January 1915 and in 1918, a centre for ship repairs. Falmouth Cemetery contains 87 First World War burials, including those of two unidentified firemen from the S.S. "Clan Cumming", attacked by German submarine in the English Channel on 5 November 1917, with the loss of 13 lives.

During the Second World War, Falmouth was a significant naval base and Royal Navy Air Station. There was also a military hospital in the town. A war graves plot contains 74 of the 111 Second World War burials within Falmouth Cemetery, the rest are scattered. Lying apart at the southernmost tip of the plot are five graves containing the remains of 27 unidentified sailors who died in the bombing of H.M.S. "Registan" on 27 May 1941. A further 4 are the graves of unidentified seamen of the Merchant Navy.

There are 4 burials of merchant seamen whose deaths were not due to war service.

There are also 13 war graves of other nationalities within the cemetery.

National Trust - Godolphin

Godolphin House & Gardens, Godolphin Cross, Helston, Cornwall, TR13 9RE

Godolphin is celebrating its mining history with a series of guided walks and themed talks. Discover how Godolphin was built with riches made from mining and learn more about this UNESCO World Heritage Site.

As part of Heritage Open Days, and in partnership with the Godolphin Cross Community Association, Godolphin is celebrating its mining history with a series of free guided walks and themed talks.

Godolphin House is open on Friday 10 and Sunday 19 September for talks led by local experts taking place in the King's Room at 11am and 2pm on both days. Arrive 30 minutes before the talk to be led through the House and discover how Godolphin was one of the most important mining sites in Cornwall. Spaces limited to 50 per talk.

See how mining activity has shaped the landscape we see today and share in the stories of Cornwall's mining past with two guided walks led by Stephen Polglase, whose family has mined at Godolphin for hundreds of years. On Monday take in Godolphin Woods, which used to be a hub of mining industry, and on Thursday explore Tregonning Hill, taking in Great Work engine house.

Both walks will start at 1.30pm and finish with refreshments at Godolphin Cross Chapel, before a shuttle bus will return you to your car at 4.30pm. Both walks are limited to 15 spaces per walk. Pre-booking is essential and sturdy footwear and waterproof clothing is advisable.

Calum Beeson from the Camborne School of Mines will lead a walk stopping at five of Liskeard's prominent 19th-century buildings to examine the source, quality and workmanship of the stonework, mostly granite. Two of the buildings are publicly owned, but two are private and not normally accessible to the public.

Liskeard Methodist Church, Barn Street, Liskeard, Cornwall, PL14 4BL

Experience the magnificence of a typical original Methodist Chapel in this splendid Grade II listed building

An exhibition based around spices and some famous meals found in the Bible

The Church will also be decorated for our Harvest Celebrations

Liskeard Methodist Church was designed by Henry Rice the local architect. It replaces an earlier church which had been opened in 1841 and burnt down in 1845. Its foundation stone was laid in that year and the building opened in 1846. The Sunday school building was completed in 1888.

The church restoration of 1889 included the rostrum/pulpit, designed in London and built by John Ugalde and his son, local craftsmen. A grand organ replaced the band at the end of the 19th century. In 1907 the gallery seats were replaced, new cathedral glass windows and the Davey family of Pensilva made the Italianate decorated plaster ceiling.

Liskeard Unlocked - The Pipewell

The Pipewell, Well Lane, Liskeard, Cornwall

Come and see the Pipewell with the gates open so that you can see the lovely stonework as well as the water source. Hosts will be there to tell everyone about the building and the slate tank where the spring water is channelled. The well is probably the main reason for the town's existence. The springs which supply it are pure and have never been known to run dry. (During the severe drought of 1976, when water rationing was enforced and standpipes were erected in the streets, Liskeard residents preferred to get their water from the Pipewell.)

For centuries the town markets were situated near it and the waters were used for washing goods - and people. The many quaint sounding regulations forbidding the washing of "bellies" and fish are recorded on the new noticeboard. As with many wells in Cornwall, there are superstitions associated with the drinking of the water which is supposed to lead to marital harmony and to cure blindness.

A rare opportunity to visit this substantial Grade II listed town centre building.

Having been home to offices of Cornwall Council for over 70 years Westbourne House has never been open to the public. The new leaseholders are undertaking a complete restoration. Visitors will be able to see their progress and read and hear of the house's history dating back to 1816.

Newquay's Sea Story

Trenance Heritage Cottages, Trenance Road, Newquay, Cornwall, TR7 2HW

Newquay's Trenance Heritage Cottages truly depict another side to this vibrant holiday town. Visitors seeking a peaceful valley experience come to enjoy the Victorian ambience to be found within three pre-railway dwellings that are unique in Cornwall

HOD will provide a new focus as we open up part of Rose Cottage, a site not normally open to daily visitors, to tell Newquay's Sea Story. There is more than a tenuous link here – one of the residents, William Henry Wilton (1848-1920), was coxswain of Newquay's Lifeboat from 1899, a proud position which earned him the RNLI's special award of thanks for more than 9 years of service.

In a special exhibition organised jointly by the trustees of the Cottages and Newquay Old Cornwall Society, we will envisage what his life was like, using photographs and anecdotal evidence collected by the Society's chairman, Len Sheppard. As Len says: "Just imagine him responding to the rocket being fired, then hastening up the steep hill from his home to join the crew as they thundered down the steepest slipway in England and the unknown challenges that lay ahead of them". Challenge enough was the launch itself and in 1917, when attempting to assist a coastal trading vessel in trouble, the James Stevens N0.5 was smashed to matchwood on the rocks below the station. Visitors to the exhibition will hear eyewitness accounts, part of an audio archive of Newquay memories. Video will be shown of dramatic launches, together with a colourful personal description of one crewman's experience: "I could never stay dry – even in a calm sea, the wave would envelope the boat as we hit the water".

Penzance Cemetery contains 35 scattered burials of the First World War. Of the 71 Second World War burials, 2 are unidentified seaman. 43 of the burials are in the war graves plot, the rest scattered. The naval casualties include 22 sailors who lost their lives in an attack by German surface craft off Mount's Bay on 6 January 1944, 17 of them being members of the crew of HM Trawler "Wallasea".

In addition the cemetery also contains 2 Foreign National burials of the 1914-18 war, including 1 unidentified French Merchant seaman, and 6 of the 1939-45 war, including 1 unidentified sailor of the German Navy.
