CORNISH SURNAMES – a short series

It was not until the mid-late middle ages that surnames were first used to distinguish between people with the same personal name. In still brythonic speaking Cornwall, as in Wales, this was even later and followed somewhat divergent patterns to England.

- 1. Patronymics:
- (a) A father's name was taken and used as a surname, without alteration: eg. Davy, Harry
- (b) A diminutive of the father's name is used, eg. Jenkin, Hockin
- (c) A Christian name, or its diminutive, is used with an English possessive 's' suffixed, eg. Johns, Roberts, Jenkins, Rogers
- (d) The prefix Map (son of) or its residual 'p' is attached to the father's name, eg. Map Robert became Probert, Map Rowse became Prowse, Map Howel became Powell.

The Gorsedh and Cornish Bards (Part 3)

From a talk given by Chris Dunkerley in 2022 & 2023 – Reproduced in 4 parts

PART 3

Citations [for nominated people] must be presented without the knowledge of the person being nominated and kept within those who need to know. Each nominee is in turn considered by the Gorsedh Council and, if found satisfactory, she or he is duly invited to become a bard. Obviously not all who are nominated are in the end invited, nor every person feel able to accept taking the oath.

The new Bards choose a Bardic name in Cornish, which is perhaps relevant to their place of birth, their particular vocation or the work which has led them to be invited into the Gorsedh. The names of these new bards are not made public until shortly before their official acceptance into the Gorsedh, now always held on the first Saturday in September.

The Gorsedh also provides other recognition. The Gorsedh Kernow Awards seek to foster and promote the national Celtic spirit of Cornwall, through awarding Awen Medals for outstanding creative and community work that expresses Cornish identity and culture.



They are divided into two categories: "Adults" and "Young People". The Holyer and Gof Awards scheme was established and is organised by Bards of Gorsedh Kernow to promote books and other publications and media about Cornwall, set in Cornwall or the diaspora, or in Cornish (Kernewek).

Australians or those living in Australia have been part of Gorsedh Kernow since 1935 (7 years after its start) when prominent UK born South Australian, Sir John Langdon Bonython (KernowTramor, or Cornishman overseas) was Two more followed but WW2 intervened before 1951 when Sydney singers Thea Rowe and Breffni Hosking), and SA cartoonist Oswald Pryor were invited. Nine more were added before 1974 when Bute, SA resident Roslyn Paterson was invited for her work establishing the Kernewek Lowender festival on the North Peninsula in SA. Its refreshed links with the current scene in Cornwall brought bardic visitors to Australia, and particularly SA including past Grand Bard Denis Trevanion who held a Gorsedh Proclamation ceremony in Queens Sq, Moonta in 1983, and then Grand Bard Hugh Miners who held a proclamation at Wallaroo Mines in 1985.

This renewed vigor and warm connections here saw 8 active Bards in Australia by 1987. With work among Bards here and local Cornish Association members past Grand Bard George Pawley White and new local Bard Ron Daw the Gorsedh Council had approved a new form of

ceremony for an *Assembly of the Bards of Cornwall in Australia*, based on the Open Gorsedd. Its first ceremony was held on St Piran's Day, 5th March, 1988 at Sovereign Hill, Ballarat, Victoria with Denis Trevanion leading and 9 other Bards.

There have now been 36 Assemblies held (18 in SA, 16 in Vic., 1 in ACT and 1 in NSW) and the 2 Proclamations. This is the most anywhere in the world other than Cornwall, though there have been a number of proclamation style gatherings held in North America.

Standing Stones Celtic Nations Monument Brisbane QLD

Over many years the Celtic Council of Qld had been planning a Celtic monument of standing stones in Brisbane. Our Association and some members had made donations to help with this project. Delays for various reasons (including issues of Council approvals, and site restrictions at Roma Street Parklands) had occurred. So it was with relief that the final version was inaugurated on Sunday 8th October, 2023 at Moorlands Park, off Coronation Drive, Auchenflower (an inner western suburb of Brisbane). The site can reached by a stroll from Auchenflower Railway Station, or a walk from the Regatta Ferry Wharf on the Brisbane River.



BYNG Cemetery Records

We have received the email below, due to the wonderful work put in by the late Dr John Symonds on Byng and Cadia, and included for some time on our CANSW web site:

"I am currently doing a research project into mapping and recording the history and details of those buried within the cemetery. I have begun obtaining death certificates, taken photos of headstones (last burial was last year), newspaper obituaries and articles etc and am on a current number of 223 burials.

I noticed on the above website there was a notation about the death and burial of Joseph Stock at Byng Cemetery in 1880, who I have added to my database. I wonder if you have been contacted by anyone else saying their ancestor is buried at Byng, in which case I

would be very happy to hear about it and add it to my list.

The cemetery is still in a very good condition and the lawns have recently been mowed and the gate hinge fixed. I am in touch with the Orange Historical Society, Orange Family History Group, and Mr Will Hawke, current custodian of the Byng Cemetery, seeking their guidance in this project.

Cornish Association of Victoria Library

Castlemaine Historical Society in Victoria is now housing a huge Cornish library, perhaps the largest outside the UK.

The collection acquired in partnership with the Cornish Association of Victoria (CAV) was unveiled on October 18 this year. It consists of about 3,500 items in a range of formats including books, journals, magazines, maps, CD-ROMs, extracts, photocopies, pamphlets and guide booklets.

The CHS Library contains over 64,000 archived historical and genealogical resources and based

New Pre-School opened teaching children to speak Cornish

A woman has opened a new pre-school nursery in Cornwall with a focus on teaching children to speak Kernewek, the indigenous Cornish language. St John Nursery School, in Camborne, was opened in September this year by French-born Emilie Champliaud. She said she had been passionate about the language ever since she moved to the Duchy with her Cornish-speaking husband 12 years ago. The key to success, she said, was the integration of both Cornish and English naturally into the

children's daily routines, and including play and song.



"If we're using it in the classroom they're going to use it at home and share it with their families," said teacher Abbie Richards. Emilie Champliaud added: "Just like native speakers, at first they don't understand - they just understand the context". "Then they relate the context and the word and then they start to become fluent in the language because it becomes their means of communication." [source BBC News]

ANCIENT CORNISH PLACES Carn Euny



Two millenia old Carn Euny Cornish village from the air that the first timber huts there were built about



200 BC, but by the 1st century BC, these had been replaced by stone huts. The remains of these stone huts are still visible today.

Carn Euny is best known for the well-preserved state of the large fogou, an underground passageway, which is more than 65 feet (20 metres) long. This fogou runs just below the surface of the ground and is roofed with massive stone slabs. The site was abandoned late in the Roman occupation period.

Notable Cornish people, people of Cornwall, and of the diaspora

Mick Fleetwood

- musician and actor, best known for his role as the drummer and co-founder of the rock band Fleetwood Mac.



Mick Fleetwood was born on June 24, 1947 in Redruth, Cornwall, as Michael John Kells Fleetwood. Fleetwood lived in Egypt and Norway for much of his childhood.

Choosing to follow his musical interests, Fleetwood travelled to London at the age of fifteen, eventually combining with Peter Green, Jeremy Spencer and Bob Brunning, at Green's behest, to become the first incarnation of Fleetwood Mac. Fleetwood would remain the only member to stay with the band through its ever-changing line-up.

After several album releases and line-up changes, the group moved to the United States in 1974 in an attempt to boost the band's success. Here Fleetwood invited Lindsey Buckingham and Stevie Nicks to join. Buckingham and Nicks contributed to much of Fleetwood Mac's later commercial success, including the celebrated album Rumours, while

Fleetwood's own determination to keep the band together was essential to the group's longevity. He has also enjoyed a solo career, published written works and flirted briefly with acting and winemaking and even appeared in a 1989 Star Trek episode.

Fleetwood, whose surname was merged with that of the group's bassist John "Mac" McVie to form the name of the band, was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame with Fleetwood Mac in 1998.

YULE / Christmas (In Cornish: Nadelik)

Was celebrated in Cornwall when it had become unfashionable to do so across much of the rest of Britain. In fact many of the customs we now think of as Christmas traditions were collected in places like Cornwall in the early 19th Century, and introduced elsewhere.

"Nadelik Lowen Ha Bledhen Nowyth Da" -Merry Christmas and Happy New year in Cornish.

Numerous distinctive traditions and practices are associated with this time of year in Cornwall including;

- The Cornish Christmas Bunch



- Cornish church towers: being illuminated on Christmas-eve.
- Triumphal arches of evergreens and flags were often seen in towns and villages
- Guise-dancing: Participants dressed in gentlemen's hand me downs and wearing masks would tour the town entertaining others with music and dance. Often led by a "Lord of Misrule" or master of ceremonies.
- Candle Dancing: dancing around a basket full of sand with brightly coloured candles in it
- The Twelfth cake: And the general celebration of 12th night as a feast.
- The lighting and chalking of the Mock or Block. It was a tradition to draw a chalk man on

the Christmas or yule log to symbolise the death of the old year and the start of the new. This was a communal activity and is still performed in public during the Montol festival in Penzance.

- The Cornish Christmas Carols: Cornwall was one of the first sites of the reintroduction of Carols after the puritan times banned them. Cornwall has provided a surprisingly large number of Carols known throughout the world. It is said that the Christmas carol service was invented in Truro, Cornwall in 1880 by a chap called Edward White Benson. The story goes that on Christmas Eve everybody in Truro would get disgustingly drunk, and that the Bishop of Truro (Benson) was so disgusted that he decided to lure everybody out of the pub and into the church with his new service. They had to be bright, easily sung and uplifting: The distinctive tunes of the regional Cornish Carols such as the St Ives and Padstow carols. The distinctive Cornish carol tunes composed by Thomas Merritt. In Australia, the unique Carols by Candlelight in mining areas (later adopted widely).
