CORNISH SURNAMES – a short series

It was not until the mid-late middle ages that surnames were first used to distinguish between people with the same personal name. In still Brythonic speaking Cornwall, as in Wales, this was even later and followed somewhat divergent patterns to England.

Part 2

2. Names from Places of Residence

These are the lost prolific of Cornish surnames. The well known prefixes of CAR or KER (fort or camp), TRE (homestead), POL (pool), PEN (head or end), ROS (heath), LAN (enclosure, incl. monastic/church), BOS (dwelling) and many others are used to form place-names in conjunction with a personal name, an adjective, or other distinctive feature.

eg. CARDEW – car-du, black or dark camp POLMEAR – pol-mur, big pond TRESKEWES –tre-skewys, sheltered homestead

PENGELLY – pen-(g)kelly, end of copse ROSEVEAR – ros-(m)veur, great heath LANDRY – lan-(t)dre, churchyard or glebe BOSCAWEN – bos-scawen, dwelling by elder

(It should be noted that the Celtic system of mutation of initial letter under certain circumstances applies. Hence the above 'm' becomes 'v' and 't' becomes 'd'. Part 3 next time

Purchase of Tregonning Hill

Cornwall Heritage Trust has purchased an historic hill near to Breage and Helston,

protecting its heritage for years to come. Tregonning Hill – 194m above sea level at its summit, is currently still on the Heritage At Risk Register. It is the most westerly of two granite hills overlooking Mounts Bay in west Cornwall; the other being Godolphin Hill. Approximately 6 kilometres (3.7 mi) north west of Helston. It has a diverse archaeological landscape with monuments dating back to the Bronze Age. It is also known as the birthplace of the British china clay industry. Much of the site is designated a Scheduled Monument and all of it is within the Cornish Mining Landscape World Heritage Site.

This acquisition aims to safeguard the 70-acre site's future and ensure it remains free to visit all year round. The site has a multi-period archaeological landscape which includes a wide range of historic monuments while the summit of the hill is crowned by the hillfort known in legend as Castle Pencair. It contains ancient Barrows, but also a war memorial, and extensive mineral working and prospecting pits and part of a china clay works notable for being the place where William Cookworthy discovered china clay.



Cornish Heritage Trust CEO Cathy Woolcock said the trust was "incredibly proud" to have purchased the historic site. She said: "The strength of feeling its sale has provoked and the support we have received both from Historic England and the public... has been truly overwhelming." Ms Woolcock also thanked those involved in supporting the project.

She added: "The hill's story spans a huge breadth of Cornish history which is why it has such complex needs. "Like many of the sites we care for, it is also important ecologically – partly designated both a Site of Special Scientific Interest and a Special Area of Conservation – which requires significant expertise to manage". "All of these factors made Tregonning Hill a perfect fit for our portfolio and we're so pleased that we can make sure it gets the care it deserves."

Helston Tourist Railway Expansion

The Helston Railway has launched an appeal to raise funds to extend the line to Helston, which will bring tourism and much-needed trade to both the town, district and the Lizard peninsula. The extension over the Lowertown Viaduct towards Helston will also help towards extending the line towards Nancegollan, which was the largest station on the <u>Helston to Hayle</u> branch and was the railhead for the fishing port of Porthleven.

The current ambition is to lay new tracks towards Helston, but to do that it needs funds and has set a target of £350,000 for the rails, ballast and infrastructure. The railway currently runs on the old line, between Prospidnick Halt and Truthall Halt, with a request stop along the way at Trevarno. Ground-works on the old right of way from Truthall Halt for expansion have started.

The last public service ran 61 years ago, but in recent year progress on restoring the line, and special train trips, has been made by a dedicated group. Future plans include extending the line back towards Nancegollan where a new station and access road will be built, as well as providing better facilities.

MONTOL

Montol Eve, a large festival that occurs in Penzance every 21st December. It is based on some of the Cornish Christmas traditions that were common before the 20th century. The biggest and most important of these traditions is guise dancing. This is a Cornish custom in which people dress up in costumes and masks and then publicly perform, parade, sing, dance and play music. When it gets dark, thousands of people dress like this to take part in three processions. The biggest procession begins at 6pm and ends by burning an image of the sun just outside the town centre.

The sun is the main image used in the festival because the 21st December is often the Winter Solstice. This is the time of year when the day is shortest and the night is longest, meaning it marks the start of longer evenings and warmer days.

Another Cornish Christmas tradition found at the Montol festival is the "Chalking of the Mock", which is the Cornish version of the Yule log.

It was traditional on Christmas Eve to get a large log to burn. Before the fire was lit, someone drew a stick man on the log in chalk. This was supposed to represent the baby Jesus or perhaps "Old Father Time". At Montol, this is the final part of the evening and someone is chosen especially to Chalk the Mock and place the log on the bonfire before it is lit.

Notable Cornish people, people of Cornwall, and of the diaspora

Henry Charlton Bastian - Neurologist and Scientist

Henry was born in Truro on 26th April 1837, the third son of James Bastian, a merchant, and Charlotte Eliza Bullmore. After attending school in Falmouth, he entered University College, London, in 1856 and graduated BA, MB in 1863, and served as Assistant Curator in University College Museum.

In 1866 he married Julia Augusta Orme and they had three sons and one daughter.

He passed the MRCP (1865) and MD (1866) and was quickly elected FRCP in 1870. He became a lecturer in pathology at St. Mary's Hospital, and in 1867 was appointed Professor of Pathology and Assistant Physician at University College Hospital.

He was one of the first neurologists appointed to the National Hospital, Queen Square. There, he conducted original investigations and pursued wide interests both in medical and biological sciences.

He was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society in 1868. For over 40 years from 1868 until his retirement in 1912, he served at the National Hospital pursuing his interest in bacteriology experiments. He died on 17th November 1915.



The Gorsedh and Cornish Bards (Part 4)

From a talk given by Chris Dunkerley in 2022 & 2023 – Reproduced in 4 parts

What does an Assembly ceremony of Cornish Bards in Australia do?



There have been a number of variations on these ceremonies, however an example is the proclamation gathering in Canberra ACT in October, 1995 reveals how they developed. Conducted totally in the Cornish language the ceremony itself began with the sounding of a horn (Corn Glwas) to the four points of the compass, a symbolic call to all Cornish around the world.

The ceremony of peace is performed by the leader, who thrice cries, "Eus cres (Is there peace)?" On the Bards thrice replying "Cres (Peace)" the proclamation Gorsedh is declared open. The Ceremony of the Offering (flowers symbolic of God's gifts to mankind, usually performed by a young lady (Lady of the Flowers) who acts on the behalf of the young people and children 'of' Cornwall in Australia! After further ceremonials the three fold Cry of Peace is repeated, and the Assembly closed.

In the full Australian Assembly ceremony of which there have been 36 over a 40 year period – the last above in 2023 at Wallaroo, SA, the Lady of the Flowers is joined by a party of girls (mostly) who perform a dance and flowers of the earth are presented. Celtic Harp music usually accompanies the ceremony! Deceased Bards are named and honoured, new Bards are

introduced to the Assembly, and visiting Bards are welcomed. All words and singing are in Kernewek, the Cornish language. Permission to hold these Assemblies must be obtained from the Grand Bard (& Council).



26th Assembly in Australia – UOW campus, Nowra, NSW

Currently there are 37 living Bards connected with Australia, and 50 are deceased.

I am very humbled and honoured to be among the 3 most long serving Bards resident in Australia, having been invited 36 years ago however I stress we have no hierarchy or formal structure here, are governed by the Council in Cornwall, and we are equal to all other Bards around the world.

CORNISH SPLITS

Recipe for a Jam or Thunder & Lightning Cream Tea

In bygone days a Cornish Cream Tea did NOT consist of Scones. Until very recently Cornish Splits were preferred and readily available. Harder to find them now, impossible in Australia, so why not bake your own?

A soft milky bread, light as a feather and perfect with jam and clotted cream. As children we loved Thunder & Lightning - Golden Syrup and Clotted Cream, as seen on the right. These days Strawberry Jam is mostly used for Cream Teas but even our later forebears would have made jam with fruits that were on the hedgerows - like Blackberry! Strawberry would have been a real luxury.



Ingredients for 20 splits: [they freeze like a dream] 1½ lb Strong Plain Flour [Bread Flour], 3 oz lard, 1 level teaspoon salt, ¾ pint milk [I used semi skimmed, but in olden days it would have been whole milk] about 12 - 14 grams of Dried Active Yeast. That's 2 sachets. [or 1½ oz of fresh], 1 teaspoon sugar

Making them: Rub the fat into the flour and salt, until it has disappeared. Meanwhile warm the milk to barely tepid with the sugar, and then whisk in the yeast. Allow to start working until frothy, then pour into the flour mix and bring together. Tip onto a lightly floured surface and start to knead. This will take approx 8 - 10 mins until smooth and the dough jumps back after poking your finger in it. Or, like me with arthritic fingers, you can use a machine with a dough hook!! Cover with lightly oiled cling film, then leave and go off to do your shopping! When it is doubled in size [depends on the temperature of the room - these took just over an hour in my warm kitchen], tip back onto the surface and knead again to knock out the air.

Baking them: Divide into 20. - just over 2 oz each. I use a digital flat scale with a plate on top to weigh. Shape into splits and place on a lightly oiled baking sheet. Put to rise again for about 30 minutes.

Bake in a hot fan oven - 190 deg C for about 15 minutes. Cool on a rack, then enjoy!!!
